Principal's Message:

I want to extend a warm 'Welcome Back' to our new and returning students and families! The St. Paul staff has been diligently preparing for our 'New Year.' As you arrive at school in the first week, you'll notice significant upgrades to our playground, basketball court, and areas in and around the school. These improvements were a result of the collaborative efforts of the Parent Council, the Administration, and our students. Our top priority is always to try to meet the needs of our St. Paul students and community!

As the Administration had shared in May last year, this 2024/25 school year marks the beginning of the 'St. Paul Hybrid' system that will offer straight Kindergarten, Grade 1 and 6 grades while still benefiting from the Multiage system in grades 2/3 and 4/5. Our positive and consistent growth has allowed us to hire Mr. Gukert as a new grade 4/5 teacher for the 2024/25 school year. This increase in teachers has also slightly lowered the number of students in each class. We hope to benefit from more 1:1 teaching moments in the classroom and continue building strong relationships with every student.

Our Jordan's Principle program is also fully scheduled and ready for this year. Weekly Indigenous teachings and activities will take place throughout all grade levels and be led by our elder, Mr. Andrew Black Plume, and others like Kendrick Fox and Traven Weasel Traveller, who will also be a part of this programming. Outside drummers, singers, and activity coordinators like Young Drums will again be a part of this extraordinary program.

St.Paul School and its Parent Council will also look to continue to offer many community events this year. We are a community that is exceptionally proud of its diversity and inclusivity, which is reflected in the events we showcase. One such event that was extremely popular with our community last year was the 'Multicultural Night.' This event attracted hundreds of community members who participated in dancing, infographics, stories, and the food tasting from more than fifteen ethnicities representing our families of St. Paul. We want to make this event even more popular as we plan to run it in late October. Please visit our new website page and digital newsletters for details on participation.

I hope you all had a fantastic summer and that your children are as eager as we are to start this year! We're excited about the opportunities and experiences that the new school year will bring. Thank you once again for your unwavering support and commitment to the St. Paul School and community.

Entering St. Paul School

For the safety of all students, our policies for entering the school are:

- Use the main entrance.
- All visitors must check in at the office.
- Parents/Caregivers are NOT permitted to attend classrooms or walk through the school.

ABSENCES

When a child is absent from school, parents are asked to call the school on the day of the absence. As we are concerned with the safety of students, we will call you should you have not already done so.

When your child is sick at school:

If a child becomes sick while at school, the parent/guardian will be notified to come and pick up the student immediately.

Please be sure to keep your contact information and the information of any additional emergency contacts up-to-date throughout the year so we are able to get your child home in a timely manner.

Medical History/Allergies:

For school staff to have a better idea of what type of medical conditions/ allergies are common with your shild we are

child we are encouraging all families to update the office with your child's medical history/ allergies. This information will help us determine



the course of action when symptoms are presented during school hours.

Supervision

Supervision is provided fifteen minutes before school, at all recesses, noon hour, for the buses after school and in the office for fifteen minutes after dismissal. Anyone arriving before or after these times is not supervised. Parents are requested to make personal arrangements for their child outside of these supervision times.



Lunch in the Classroom and Microwaves

St. Paul School continues to provide a supervised lunch program. Students have a <u>minimum</u> of 20 minutes to eat and more if they require it. <u>Please Note:</u> <u>MICROWAVES</u> have been returned to all classrooms at this time.

Student can reheat (not cook) their food for a max of 30secs. No frozen meals or un-popped popcorn please!



Notice to Parent or Guardian of Religious Permeation

St. Augustine of Hippo 354-430 (Feast Day: August 28)

St. Augustine of Hippo was an unlikely saint, but a very influential one. Living between 354 and 430 AD in what is today Algeria, St. Augustine became a Doctor of the Church, meaning that his influence on Catholic theology and philosophy was vast and enduring. His writings, including City of God and Confessions remain important works to study even today.

However, St. Augustine was not always so religious. He was born into an upper class family with a devout mother, Monica (who later became a saint herself), but in his youth lived wildly and rejected his Christian upbringing. A brilliant student, Augustine lived in Carthage, Rome, and Milan while completing his education and beginning to work as a professor. With the constant prayer of his mother, Augustine returned to Christianity and was influenced greatly by Ambrose of Milan, the Bishop (and later also a saint).

A key moment in his conversion was his reading of the letter of St. Paul to the Romans. After being baptized in 387, Augustine returned to Hippo the following year and became first a priest, and then the Bishop of Hippo by 395. He was well known for his sermons, which were engaging (and often quite lengthy). For the last 35 years of his life, he preached constantly and dedicated himself to the conversion of his local people to Christianity, and became known for many of his contributions to the development of Christian thought. But he was also highly practical and focused on the needs of those around him, as expressed in this quotation:

"What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like."

The Apostles' Creed

As part of our call to *Proclaim* this year, we are going to focus on elements of the Apostles' Creed each month, starting with an overview of creeds in general. A creed is a summary of beliefs; it comes from the Latin word Credo, which means "I believe." We are likely familiar with the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed, which are the two main Creeds that we use in the Catholic Mass. While we say in these creeds "I believe," we do that alongside all of our brothers and sisters in faith, a unifying proclamation of what it is that we believe in. The creeds are combinations of historical truths with statements of faith, and have been derived over time from the earliest Christians.

In Lumen Fidei, Pope Francis writes that:

"Faith is necessarily ecclesial; it is professed from within the body of Christ as a concrete communion of believers...Faith is not a private matter, a completely individualistic notion or a personal opinion: it comes from hearing, and it is meant to find expression in words and to be proclaimed...Faith...enables us to become part of the Church's great pilgrimage through history until the end of the world."

As we seek to become Pilgrims of Hope this year, let us contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.



"Proclaiming" In Our Schools



22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

"This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me..." — Mark 7:6

Have you ever tasted 100% pure chocolate? It looks luscious and sweet but because it has no sugar in it, it tastes bitter and dry. It's not at all like milk chocolate found in the candy we love so much. Can you think of other things that look good on the outside but are quite different on the inside? When people bully and degrade others, it should be a warning sign to us not to follow their example. To be a follower of Jesus, we must love like he does.

Gospel Reading: Mark 7:31-37

"They were exceedingly astonished and they said, "He has done all things well. He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak." — Mark 7:37

In today's Gospel, we read about a fantastic miracle Jesus performed. He restored a man's hearing and speech. Imagine someone you know who is sick or hurt right now. How excited would you be if Jesus healed that person right before your eyes? It would be hard not to shout your excitement to let everyone know the good news!

But Jesus still performs miracles every day, and often we don't even notice. Place your hand on your wrist and feel your blood pumping through your body. Or, stare at a black and white image for about 30 seconds; then close your eyes and see how the image is now reversed. It's pretty amazing that God created our bodies to work the way they do. Take notice today and see how many astonishing things God has done and is still doing!

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Mark 8:27-35

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." — Mark 8:34

An old saying states: "Anything worth doing is worth doing well." Here's an example of what that saying means: Let's say that you volunteer to help a sick or elderly neighbor by raking his leaves, but instead of finishing the job, you leave the piles for him to bag and put out to the curb himself. Maybe you grew tired or wanted to do something that was more fun, so you left the task half done. Your intentions were good at the beginning, but unless you finished, you haven't done your job very well.

Jesus was faced with a very difficult task. He didn't want to suffer and be killed any more than any person does, but he knew people might kill him because he was standing up for the truth and trying to do the right thing. Jesus was committed to finishing

the task he began out of love for us. He wouldn't stop doing the right things even though he knew he w	ould get kille	ed for it	. As
followers of Jesus, we too need to help others, regardless of the price we must pay. Is there a task we left only partly done that we need to complete out of love for someone else?

Gospel Reading: Mark 9:30-37

"Where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder...the wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable, gentle...the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace for those who cultivate peace." — James 3:16-18

Do I find myself living in the wisdom God gives, in peace and gentleness and the other gifts of the Holy Spirit that I received at my baptism? Or do I find myself more often wrapped up in my wants: wanting my own way, wanting what others have, etc.? Jesus' disciples were upset that some other people who weren't followers of Jesus were doing good things for him. They thought they were special because they were in the "in" crowd by following Jesus but the others weren't. Jesus teaches them that it's not about some people being "in" the group and others being "outside" of the group. Everyone who does good things and lives lovingly is on Jesus' side, even if they don't say they are following Jesus! He teaches us that there are plenty of good people in the world that might not go to the same church or even be the same religion as us and they will be rewarded for their good works too.


